## **US Advocacy**

#### **Africa Food Security Event**



On September 26, AFJN Executive Director Dr. Steven Nabieu Rogers joined key partners to meet with Fr. Charles Chilufya, SJ, Director of Justice Ecology for Africa and Madagascar. Held at the Bread for the World office, the meeting explored potential collaboration with the Jesuits in the Sahel region, focusing on achieving the African Union's Agenda 2063 and the United Nations' (UN) Sustainable Development Goals. Specifically, discussions

centered on leveraging Africa's potential to become a global breadbasket, ensuring land, food and nutrition security for all.

#### **USTR Meeting on US-Kenya STIP Negotiations**

On September 25, AFJN participated in the eighth public listening session with the Office of the United States Trade Representative's United States (US) - Kenya Strategic Trade and Investment Partnership (STIP) negotiations that covered: agriculture; customs, trade facilitation, and enforcement; environment; good regulatory practices, inclusivity; legal and administrative matters; and workers' rights and protections.



On September 21, Dr. Rogers was a panelist during the "Pan African Future, Faith and the Vision of Food Security for All" presentation at the UN Future's Summit Black Futures Summit Side Event where he spoke on the "Future Faith and Ancestral Foundations for Food Security".

#### **Congressional Black Caucus Prayer Breakfast**



Dr. Rogers joined a gathering of faith leaders at the Congressional Black Caucus Prayer Breakfast on September 14. Notably, during the event, Dr. Beverly Goines, from Georgetown University's Department of Theology and Religious Studies, revealed that she incorporates AFJN's case studies into her teaching modules on advocacy, highlighting AFJN's valuable contributions to the field. Dr. Rogers is exploring

opportunities for collaboration with Dr. Goines to expand the reach of AFJN's advocacy model.

#### **Burkina Faso**

#### Peace through Agriculture: Educating Communities and Youth



On October 8 and 10, AFJN held "Contribution a la consolidation de la paix durable par l'emploi des jeunes dans l'agriculture [Contribution to the consolidation of lasting peace through the employment of young people in agriculture]" workshops to identify sustainable solutions for building peace in Burkina Faso by encouraging young people to get involved in agriculture. The event was covered by local media.

#### Cameroon



AFJN has launched a partnership with the Cameroonian Catholic Ecclesiastical Province of Garoua to address birth registration challenges. The partnership aims to share experiences, identify challenges, and improve the birth registration process in the predominantly Muslim region. In Cameroon, birth certificate issuance is hindered by corruption, ignorance of the law, poverty, and bad governance, affecting tens of thousands of individuals.

Without a birth certificate, children face severe consequences, including limited education, no national identification, and restricted access to government services. AFJN has been promoting timely birth registration and facilitating late registrations in South-West Cameroon, with plans to hold a mobile court for undocumented children.

#### **Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC)**

#### **Peace Caravan: Spreading Peace through Song and Dance**



Organized by Artistes Musician for Paix (AMP) in partnership with AFJN, the Peace Caravan spread a powerful message of unity and coexistence throughout Goma, North Kivu, on November 29. The event promoted cultural diversity through music, dance, and community engagement. It served as a follow-up to AFJN's project aimed at promoting peace and preventing violence based on ethnicity, using music to change minds and influence opinions. Nine ethnic groups participated, celebrating their shared heritage, while performers debuted the multi-language song "Let Us Live Together," which deeply resonated with the audience. The Caravan also visited the camp for displaced persons, using music to heal trauma and uplift spirits. The enthusiastic response from the community highlighted the transformative power of grassroots peacebuilding efforts in the DRC.

#### Sierra Leone

**Building a Culture of Practical Advocacy in Sierra Leone** 





As part of AFJN's ongoing efforts to combat land grabbing in Sierra Leone, a workshop was held on December 12, 2024, in collaboration with CARITAS Freetown and the Spiritan Development Office Ghana. The event, organized in partnership with the Archdiocese of Freetown's Catholic Youths Organization InterUnit, brought together 64 young

Catholics from 29 parishes. During the full-day training at St. John Paul II Quasi Parish in Freetown, participants gained a deeper understanding of advocacy rooted in Catholic social teaching. This initiative aims to identify and empower youth leaders to work with communities affected by land grabbing, raising awareness and mobilizing them to advocate for their rights.

#### **Ghana - WEP**

#### **Combating Child Marriage and Domestic Servitude in Ghana**



In September, AFJN Ghana hosted a five-day workshop in Sunyani, bringing together 70 participants from across the country. Representing women religious, priests, parish representatives, and Muslim communities, the group united to tackle early and child marriage, as well as domestic servitude. A highlight of the workshop was an advocacy visit to the local bishop, who is notably building a center for vulnerable girls in his diocese. To ensure sustained momentum, AFJN Women Empowerment Coordinator, Sr. Eucharia Madueke, SNDdeN, also conducted follow-up activities with participants.

In December, AFJN-Ghana amplified its advocacy efforts through radio campaigns, including a broadcast on Radio

#### Nigeria - WEP

#### **Empowering Women in Akwa Ibom: A Community-Led Approach**





Following a high-level stakeholder meeting in August, the Supreme Council in Akwa Ibom committed to engaging the "mboho mme Ette Idung" (village heads and their wives) to address pressing community issues, including early marriage and domestic servitude. The council head, HRM Etinyin, proposed establishing caretaker committees to tackle harmful practices at the next council meeting. Additionally, AFJN-Nigeria successfully engaged the Supreme Council of Traditional Rulers Women Wing, securing commitments from Paramount Rulers'

Wives to spread awareness and support the cause. Dr. Mrs. Glory Edet, Former Commissioner of Women Affairs, also pledged support for their advocacy efforts, demonstrating a strong commitment to community-led women's empowerment in Akwa Ibom.

#### **Engaging Youth to Combat Child Exploitation in Akwa Ibom**



In September, AFJN engaged with 143 students at Modern Comprehensive Secondary School. The school committed to joining AFJN's youth advocacy group, further solidifying efforts to combat these issues.

Building on this momentum, AFJN-Nigeria held a Youth Advocacy Training workshop for 40 dynamic youth in October, followed by several advocacy training events, including a school sensitization and a radio program on the state Child Rights Act. In November, AFJN-Nigeria's State Youth Coordinator joined an

advocacy visit to Life and Light Comprehensive Secondary School, engaging over 683 students and establishing a youth club to serve as a platform for ongoing awareness and advocacy efforts.



#### **Advocacy Training for Women Religious in Benue State**





AFJN hosted a five-day advocacy training for Women Religious Communities in four Catholic Dioceses in Benue State in October. Led by Sr. Eucharia and Fr. Aniedi Okure, OP, the training equipped over 70 sisters with essential advocacy skills. As a culmination of their training, the sisters embarked on advocacy visits to key state officials, including the Commissioner for Women Affairs, the High Chief of Benue State, and the Speaker of the State House of Assembly.

AFJN-Nigeria conducted a series of workshops and sensitization campaigns across various local government areas in Nigeria, targeting Catholic women, youth, and community leaders. From August to November, these events drew over 5,600 participants, focusing on the dangers of child marriage, domestic servitude, and child labor. Survivors shared their experiences, and community leaders pledged to take action, appointing welfare officers and vowing to report



In September, The AFJN-Nigeria Youth Advocacy Team conducted community sensitization and church outreach programs in Igbudu and Inyimagu, Ikwo LGA, engaging 421 participants. Trained youth advocates led the events, focusing on ending child marriage and domestic servitude. Key stakeholders and community members agreed to prohibit domestic servitude for children under 18 without proper permission, and educational materials were distributed to inform and empower the community.

In November, youth advocates, supported by AFJN,



conducted a successful church outreach program at Ascension Church, Ndieborishiagu, in Ebonyi State, engaging 210 attendees. The event raised awareness about the harmful impacts of child marriage and domestic servitude, receiving strong support from church leaders and members. Leaders pledged to spread awareness and advocate for child rights and welfare, demonstrating significant community interest in supporting child protection initiatives.


